



Alpharetta Celebrates Success of Multi-Club Brazil Project



The **Rotary Club of Alpharetta** is celebrating the shared success of a global grant and construction project made possible by clubs from D6900, New England D7780 and Pelotas, R.S. Brazil D4680.

In all, 14 Rotary clubs across three districts have partnered financially and with in-kind contributions to establish a \$70,000 Down Syndrome occupational therapy program and construction of a 6,200 sq.ft. education and headquarters facility for APADPEL – The Association of Parents of Down Syndrome Persons in Pelotas.

KUDOS to the Rotary Clubs of **Roswell, Dunwoody, Stone Mountain, Peachtree City and Atlanta-Brazil** for supporting this international success!

During a November project Zoom call, Pelotas-Oeste PP Luiz Bernardi and incoming D4680 DG Conrad confirmed \$240,000 of pledges from local/regional Brazilian businesses, and confirmation from the State of Rio Grande do Sul to fund remaining phases of the APADPEL Training & Education building...on land donated by the city of Pelotas. Classes, therapy and occupational courses enabled by the 2022 global grant will take place in the new building. The city of Pelotas and the Brazilian state of Rio Grande do Sul have embraced work set in motion by Rotary International, and corporate/government partners have

committed to support this project for ongoing community benefit. Now that's sustainability!

A January 2024 celebration trip to Pelotas is in the works. Any and all D6900 Rotarians are invited to attend.

Acquiring the Brazilian equivalent of a Certificate of Occupancy is close at hand, and fundraising is underway for a final contribution to finish facility construction. While GRSP spends the year hosting international college students, we are thankful for this opportunity allows college students from Georgia to spend the summer attending school and exchanging cultural

customs in Norway. Olso International Summer School includes students from all over the world in a diverse cultural program in the beautiful city of Oslo, Norway with six weeks of academic achievement and international goodwill. Students must have a valid passport. Applications will be reviewed and all applicants will be notified by the end of January 2024. The opportunity is open to undergraduate and graduate college students who have completed their sophomore year of college by the end of Spring Semester 2024. Students must be between the ages of 20 to 24, single, in good health and academic standing plus willing to serve as an ambassador for Georgia Rotarians.

Scholarship includes air fares from Atlanta to Oslo and return to Atlanta. Scholarship also includes 12credit hours of undergraduate coursework or one graduate course, one weekend-excursion, administered by the University of Oslo, room, board and administrative fees for the International Summer School at the University of Oslo.

East Cobb Shops for 300+ Veterans



The **Rotary Club of East Cob**b recently demonstrated its commitment to community service by successfully executing a heartwarming project in collaboration with United Military Care, a non-profit organization based in Cobb County. This impactful endeavor was made possible through the generous support of a Rotary Foundation Grant and the unwavering dedication of East Cobb Rotary's members, to grow local economics and help veterans through a rebound relief program after the devastating impact of COVID-19 and the economic aftermath.

In this noteworthy undertaking, the club shopped on behalf of 308 homeless veterans, ensuring that their essential needs were met. The shopping list was substantial, involving the procurement of 616 t-shirts and 924 men's briefs. Each deserving veteran received not one, but two t-shirts and three pairs of briefs. In addition to this generous support, club members went the extra mile by donating an additional \$700 out of their own pockets, specifically earmarked to address other essential needs not covered by the grant.

Confronted with the monumental task of handling such a considerable quantity of items, the members of East Cobb Rotary exhibited exceptional teamwork and banded together after their weekly meeting. They efficiently organized themselves into an assembly line, streamlining the packaging process. With the clock ticking before most people even hit the snooze button, this early morning breakfast club showed that they were not just early birds; they were the ones who caught the worms and cooked up a hearty breakfast of positive change. Their incredible mission, completed before 9 am, illustrated the power of Rotarian involvement in local economic growth and providing crucial assistance to veterans in their time of need.

Columbus Presents Nearly \$7,000 and In-Person Support to Community Groups



The **Rotary Club of Columbus** recently completed two projects that work with local organizations to serve local youth in Columbus. First, the club presented grants totaling \$6,860 to five local nonprofits to support their work in the community. Second, 16 Rotarians, including the District Governor, collaborated with Cure Violence, Girls Inc, and Parks & Recreation to provide a program to youth at the Frank D. Chester Recreation & Senior Center on Wednesday, October 11.

The club invites its almost 300 members to donate the number of dollars greater than or equal to their age on their birthday every year. Those funds are earmarked for the club's Children's Fund, which disburses grants to local nonprofits. This year, five grants totaling \$6,860 were awarded to Clement Arts for a student-led art show, Open Door Community House for a STEAM robotics program, the Columbus Symphony Orchestra's Making Music Matters program, the Youth Orchestra of Greater Columbus for their Whitewater Music Festival, and the Chattahoochee Council, BSA for their Scouting program. The grants were awarded at the August 30 meeting at the Columbus Trade Center. In October, Columbus Rotarians collaborated with Cure Violence, Girls Inc, and Parks & Recreation to provide food and a program to youth at the Frank D. Chester Recreation & Senior Center. Rotarians spoke inspirational words of encouragement that it is possible to choose a productive path in life and shared career advice with the youth. Volunteers served the youth a meal and engaged in some friendly competition on the basketball court to round out the evening. "Thank you so much for the encouragement and push." 

The Secret of the Jekyll Island One-Day Pass



Did you know that Jekyll Island is a state park? In 1950, the Jekyll Island-State Park Authority was established by the State of Georgia to govern and manage the island. The Jekyll Island Authority serves as steward of the island, overseeing all natural areas and commercial operations of the island.

When you cross the bridge onto the island you will pay a \$10 entry fee. The receipt shows it's a "1 Day Pass." The truth is, as long as you remain on the island all you will pay is \$10. Whether you stay one night or ten nights, you will only pay if you leave the island to visit a nearby attraction away from Jekyll and then return.

Here's more information about Jekyll Island - Jekyll Island is a barrier island off the southeastern coast of Georgia. In 1886, Jekyll Island was purchased by a group of millionaires for use as an exclusive, private retreat known as "The Jekyll Island Club." Jekyll Island was purchased by the State of Georgia in 1947 from the Jekyll Island Club. This part of Jekyll is now the Historic District.

The Authority oversees the operation, maintenance and promotion of the island's amenities and Historic District, and the provision of municipal services for the island's residential community, 10 hotels, rental cottages and businesses.

Various amenities are operated by the Authority, which include the Historic District, 63 holes of golf, a tennis center, miniature golf and bike rental, Summer Waves Waterpark, an oceanfront soccer complex, a 55,000 square foot Convention Center, restaurants, and a campground. The Authority provides a fire department/emergency medical service and maintains several public picnic areas, beach crossovers, bike paths, a boat ramp, and a small airstrip.

Jekyll Island is a place where nature and humanity peacefully co-exist. The most accessible of Georgia's protected barrier islands, most of Jekyll remains in a natural state, and development is tightly limited to preserve the balance. The island is home to more than a thousand acres of mature maritime forest, an icon of the coastal South that has become threatened by over development throughout its range.

From the moment you see the vast marshes that line the causeway, you'll know you've arrived in a place blessed with natural beauty. The terrapin-crossing signs along the way tell you this is a place where people truly cherish our natural resources and are working hard to protect wildlife.

In 2011, the Jekyll Island Authority established a thoroughly vetted Conservation Program with the mission of preserving and enhancing the island's natural bounty, while providing nature-based educational and recreational opportunities. Conservation remains a central pillar of the parks' mission—from protecting nesting loggerhead turtles and dune systems to preserving the integrity of the tidal marshes and everything in between. Over the last decade, the visitor experience has been enhanced to sustain Jekyll Island's economic viability; yet, all revitalization has occurred within existing, developed land, without reducing the island's protected undeveloped land by a single acre.

Whether through Ranger Walks or educational trips to the Georgia Sea Turtle Center, guests can celebrate the island's natural history, and natural future, by learning from it – and by seeking harmony with it.
